
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# Sculpture: From Antiquity To The Present Day

With all due respect, this is, in all honesty, strictly a medium-sized book. It is not as large, lavish, copious and comprehensive, as one may be lead to believe. It is not at all a coffee table edition. Itâ <sup>™</sup>s indeed thick and somewhat heavy, but not really large. Because of its medium-sized page dimensions, photographs are presented, in most cases, in timid formats (which does, in my view, a disservice to the beautiful sculptures themselves), however nicely produced and printed. Conceptually, the book is structured, according to my taste, in a rather chaotic, rushed fashion. It is divided into different â œpartsâ •, each one with its own, isolated logic and its little table of content (and such separate table of contents themselves tend to show superficial, subjective and not too informative headings). There is no general table of content in the book. One opens it and is not

offered its general plan. It is not even possible to figure out how many parts the book entails, unless one flips through all its pages. There is not an artistsâ <sup>™</sup> index eitherâ |! This means you cannot search for a particular sculpture or artist. One is then tied to the bookâ <sup>™</sup>s own chaotic, mostly subjective, and questionable sequence, if one decides to search for any particular information. The scope covered by its authors is uneven and biased, notably Eurocentric, with important, unacceptable gaps. For instance, major Brazilian sculptor Aleijadinho, worldly recognized as one of the greatest masters of Baroque of all time, is not to be found anywhere in this overview. Judging by Taschenâ <sup>™</sup>s outstanding reputation and by other fellow reviewersâ <sup>™</sup> takes, I expected a lot more from the book. Taschen is still owing sculpturesâ <sup>™</sup> lovers a less timid, less biased, better organized and finely edited work on the subject. Very best regards to all from Brazil! Peace! Claudio
