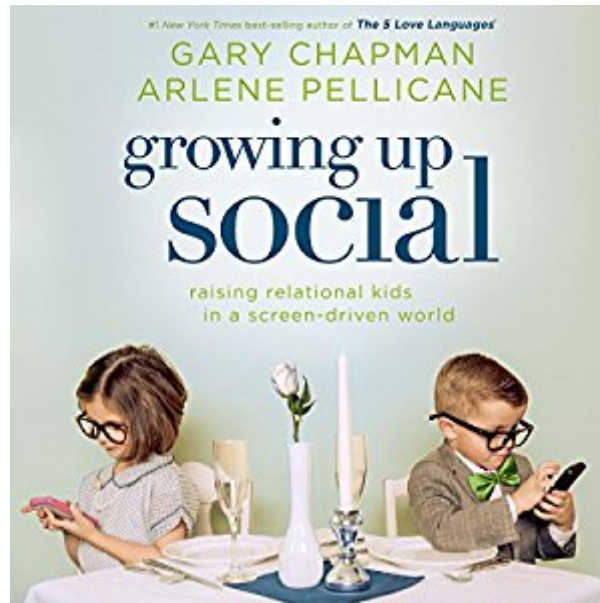

I didn't realize that setting technology boundaries would start so early! My daughter is not even 2 yet, but is already quite interested in our phones. I want to make sure I set a good foundation for her

technology use, so I was thrilled when I heard about Growing up Social. We were fortunate enough to have Arlene Pellicane speak at our MOPS group at church last year and I have been listening to her podcast and following her blog since then. I have read several of her other books including 31 Days to a Happy Husband and 31 Days to becoming a Happy Wife. Arlene's writing is down to earth and practical. She discusses tough topics and shares the truth, yet you don't come away feeling judged. I knew that her approach to technology would be a balanced one that I could trust. And I was right. I loved the book and feel much better equipped to set healthy boundaries for technology with my daughter. The book breaks down the impact of technology on kids and openly discusses the pros and cons of technology use. Then it discusses what they call the A+ Method for Relational Kids, which includes 5 key relational skills: Affection, Appreciation, Anger Management, Apology, and Attention. They discuss how technology use affects the development of these skills and give practical ways you can help your kids learn all 5 so they will be ready for a successful social life offline. The book then covers several other key topics relating to parenting and technology. I especially liked the chapter where Dr. Chapman breaks down the Love Languages and how screen time can keep your child from feeling loved in their language. I also came away with some thoughts on how I'd like to change my technology use when I am with my daughter.

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
